

Florida Weather

- Tropical Storms
- Hurricanes
- Floods
- Extreme Heat
- Freezing Temperatures
- Wildfires



Considerations

Disaster plan should include all levels and consider the following:

- Safety level of <u>existing shelter</u>
- Plan <u>local relocations</u> if the existing shelter is not appropriate or safe for the expected conditions
- In case of <u>mandatory evacuation</u>, be prepared with a plan that includes transportation, provision, accommodations, staffing

Low Severity

- Consult your Disaster Response Protocol! The CoC should have one as well as individual providers and programs
- Low severity may allow for <u>using existing shelter</u> buildings and allowing for additional guests.
- Make sure you have <u>enough provisions</u> for existing guests and new guests seeking shelter.
- Have enough <u>water, food</u> and basic needs items for <u>one</u> <u>week</u> for everyone
- Assume staff will have to stay as well and include them in your provision calculations
- Start working with clients to get them on the <u>Florida</u>
 <u>Special Needs Registry</u> if needed.



Medium Severity

Your existing shelters location or facility may not be safe enough for the coming conditions.

Plan to relocate quests to other, local accommodations that are safe.

- Places of worship
- Local Armories
- Schools
- Hotels/Motels







Medium Severity

- Homeless service providers should help clients contact family and friends they could stay with in an emergency.
- If clients have individual places to stay safely and temporarily, that would be preferred in many cases.
- Sometimes this sparks family and friend reunification!



High Severity

- Mandatory evacuation
- Get clients already on the Special Needs Registry to appropriate disaster shelters
- Have an established evacuation plan including proposed routes of travel
- Take enough provisions with you for everyone being evacuated for at least 3 days



Outreach to Unsheltered



A week prior to onset of weather, have outreach workers visit camps to share info on;



Potential shelter locations



Emergency contacts



Provide additional tarps and large plastic storage containers to help keep belongings dry



Leave cards/flyers with a number to call if they need help seeking shelter immediately

Outreach to Unsheltered

Continue outreach over the coming days as long as it is safe to do so.

If possible 1-2 days prior to the weather event, use a bus/large passenger van to help gather unsheltered clients to take to shelter along with a few personal items.

As the conditions worsen and seem more immanent, those reluctant to seek shelter, do change their minds.

Keep offering info and shelter

For those refusing shelter, help them be as safe as possible

Outreach to Unsheltered

- Assess for dead trees, low lying areas near there sleeping areas
- Encourage relocation of sleeping area if they are directly in harms way





Roles in Planning

Continuum of Care (CoC)

- Your local CoC is responsible for coordinating and overseeing homeless services and programs through a network of providers.
- They know how many residential programs
 exist, how many beds are in each and how full
 a program is at any given time
- They should be leading disaster planning efforts in partnership with county emergency management and health departments
- They should be exchanging info with service providers






Homeless Service Providers

- internal P&Ps specific to residential programs on protocol for preparing/responding to disaster.
- providers disaster plans shared with CoC in case of provider staff turn over.
- include contact information so CoC can reach you and program staff for status updates.

Regional Emergency Management Coordination Teams

- DEM can help with planning, contacts, communication and identification of RESOURCES!
- Expert staff lend capacity to response
- Form a relationship and plan before disaster strikes!
- Regional team can help connect you with your county DEM

Health Departments



- Make call on what temps are life threatening
- Assist in in climate weather planning
- Shared community decision making
- Health/medical expertise/considerations

Special Needs Shelters

- Residents of emergency shelter, transitional housing and those living in unsheltered settings may have special medical needs that qualify them to be added to the special needs shelter registry.
- Make this a question upon intake rather than the onset of emergency!
- Help clients register at <u>Home Page Special Needs Registry</u> (flhealthresponse.com)



More on SpNS

- Health Departments administer/staff Special Needs Shelter
- Eligibility
 - special medical needs
 - care exceeds the basic first aid
 - impairments or disabilities who are medically stable and do not require medical care
- People with disabilities are not required to go to a Special Needs Shelter. Some people with disabilities can be safely accommodated in a general population shelter.
- The capabilities of each SpNS varies based upon a community's needs and available resources. SpNS by county available <u>Shelters | Florida Disaster</u>

What is a Disaster Response Plan?

- Aka; Emergency Operations Plan, Disaster Management Plan, Etc.
- Is a guide/recipe for what to do when disaster strikes
- Gives clear direction for those who will respond
- Defines aggreged upon assumptions
- Must be flexible and adaptable to multiple situations




Characteristics of a Good Plan

- The plan must be based on facts or valid assumptions
- The plan must be based on available community resources
- The plan must provide the necessary organizational structure
- Use understandable language and terminology
- The plan must be coordinated, published and exercised



Disaster Planning Cycle

Individuals with disabilities/mobility issues

 Logistics in transport, medical supplies, movement



Pets/Animals

- Some shelters allow for pets
- Partner with humane society/local rescues for temp placements



Communication



- Automated texting service
- Alternate communication
- Follow up/Check ins
 - Individual
 - Daily set time for group
- Communicate necessary revisions to executing the Emergency Plan
- Facilitate open feedback loop to improve plan


