Two Types of State Housing Disaster Recovery Funding



- House Bill 3A/Senate Bill 4A for Disaster Relief during December Special Legislative Session:
- \$150 million for housing recovery for Hurricanes lan and Nicole
 - \$60 million: Hurricane Housing Recovery Program
 - \$90 million: Rental Recovery Loan Program



Legislature used General Revenue not Sadowski Housing Trust Funds

- Recognizes that SHIP and SAIL are the ways to deploy disaster housing resources
 - HHRP is deployed through SHIPeligible cities and counties
 - Rental Recovery Loan Program is like State Apartment Incentive Loan Program (SAIL)





First HHRP Funds Provided January 26



- First installment for \$20 million of the \$60 million is called HHRP Allocation 1
- More funds may arrive before June or in the 23/24 state fiscal year
- The remaining \$40 million will be allocated once the FHFC has evaluated more FEMA data
- Options for HHRP Funds
 - Deposit in SHIP account
 - Separate HHRP account

SHIP and HHRP Similarities

- Both use the statewide infrastructure of local housing administrators
- Mostly same types of housing assistance
- Target the same income categories
- Use the same income qualification process
- Primarily focus on homeownership assistance



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Differences between SHIP and HHRP

- Sources of Assistance: After Disaster, SHIP may not be the only resource available. Avoid Duplication of Benefits
- <u>Timeline</u>: Some HHRP allocations might take longer than 3 years to expend
- HHRP Focus: applicants directly impacted by Hurricane Ian and/or Nicole





First HHRP Tasks



- Decide on HHRP assistance to provide
- Update LHAP strategies
- Announce Funding Availability
- Take Applications
- Decide on selection process
- Address staffing needs



Deadlines for Expending Funds



All HHRP allocated in the 23/24 state fiscal year

- Encumbered by June 30, 2024
- Expended by June 30, 2025

"Since we know that many recovery activities take time, we will accept requests for expenditure extensions using the same process as SHIP."



Reporting Requirements

HHRP is part of the SHIP Report

This is the same as SHIP-DR reporting

The first installment of HHRP (Allocation #1) is reported alongside 22/23 SHIP funds.

Future HHRP installments will be reported with 23/24 SHIP funds.

Uses for and Restrictions on HHRP

- HHRP is guided by the LHAP that covers 22/23
- Not just the Disaster
 Strategy- use any appropriate
 LHAP Strategy
- To update a strategy requires a technical revision
- To add a strategy requires a plan amendment and advertising for 30 days







Types of HHRP Assistance

Assistance to Directly-Impacted Applicants

Short-Term:

- Relocation: Temporary Rental Assistance for displaced households
- Emergency Repairs
- Foreclosure or Eviction Prevention



HHRP Long-Term Assistance

- Home Rehabilitation
- Insurance Deductibles
- Replacement Housing
- Foreclosure/Eviction Prevention
- Relocation: Rent Deposit or Purchase Assistance when displaced households are permanently moving





HHRP Examples from Past Allocations

2005:

\$208M from Florida General Revenue

2019:

\$65M from Sadowski Housing Trust Fund

2020:

\$20M for Hurricane Michael Counties







Home Rehabilitation

Gadsden County

\$3 million for: 29 Rehabilitations and 15 Demo/Reconstructions









Replacement Housing

Jackson County

Dedicated \$4.4 million expended or encumbered for 26 projects involving the reconstruction of a home





New Manufactured Housing

Calhoun County

Provided Replacement Housing with new Manufactured Housing Units









HHRP Implementation Examples

Contract Out Implementation:

- Holmes County & Washington County contracted out HHRP
- HHRP implemented by Emerald Coast Regional Planning Council







Involving Volunteers in Home Rehabilitation



Example from 2005 HHRP

- Hardee County and Mennonite Disaster Resource
- Volunteers complete SHIP-Funded home repair
- Mennonite Disaster Service completed SHIP-funded home repairs in Hardee County
- Permits pulled by Homeowner or Contractor overseeing volunteers





Other HHRP Topics: Pay Attention to the Administrative Budget



- The 10% Admin Budget must pay for the full implementation of HHRP funds received
- Some communities will receive large amounts
 - No more admin is available even if it takes more than 3 years to expend HHRP funds
- Internal Practice: Separately track SHIP and HHRP Admin



The Role of Project Delivery Costs

- In addition to the 10% administrative budget, account for Project Delivery Costs (PDC)
- PDCs are paid from program funds, not the admin budget
- PDCs must be "reasonable" and not overlapping with admin
- Best practice: staff tracks PDC work on timesheet detailing work per rehab project





Project Delivery Costs

Rehabilitation:

- Initial Inspection
- Work Write Up/Cost Estimate
- Construction inspections/oversight

Outsource to 3rd Party:

Service Delivery Fee

Purchase Assistance:

- Housing Counseling
- Inspection





Administrative Costs

- Advertising
- Outreach and Pre-screening
- Applications and Eligibility Determination
- LHAP Work
- Prep for the Monitor

- Office space, Utilities, Copier, Computers
- Tracking and Reporting







Communities with Smaller Allocations

What if our city is getting a smaller allocation that is not adequate to assist at least one applicant?

Options in the January 23 FHFC email:

- "Notify us that you wish not to receive the funds... (they) will flow back to the county."
- "Work within an interlocal agreement... please notify us."
- "If you decline the first allocation, it does not make you ineligible for the second allocation."





Update on SHIP Disaster Assistance



Other SHIP Disaster Assistance



- Purchase of emergency supplies
- Interim repairs and tree & debris removal
- Construction of wells or repair of existing wells
- Payment of insurance deductibles for rehabilitation
- Rental assistance and security deposit of displaced recipients
- Temporary rent, mortgage and utility payments
- Relocation and moving expense





SHIP Disaster Updates

9 counties reserved \$10.54 million SHIP funds for Disaster-Lee County with largest allocation of \$4.68 million

Examples allocation and activities:

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Collier County - $1 million for owner-occupied rehab
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Hardee County - \$690,000 for rental, repairs and deductibles

Osceola County - \$500,000 for rental, repairs and deductibles

Seminole County - \$500,000 for repairs and deductibles

Charlotte County - \$400,000 for repairs and rapid re-housing

Volusia County - \$400,000 for repairs, deductibles, and relocation

Desoto County - \$250,000 for rental, repairs and deductibles



SHIP Updates

- As of 01/24/23, 2,487 applications have been received
- \$2 million has been encumbered or expended
- Most are still accepting paper and online applications



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SHIP Disaster Updates

Issues and concerns reported:

- Incomplete or not enough applications
- Available contractors to complete work
- Awaiting completion of SHIP-DR
- No flood insurance or uninsured
- Delay in scheduling repairs
- Staffing limitation



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Clear Communication

Among staff

- Understand the program
- Duties and responsibilities
- Roles

Among contractors

- What is the process
- What the program limits are
- What the repercussions are for non-compliance

Among homeowners

- How the program works
- What the program limits are
- What they can expect
- What the program does not do <u>or allow</u>







Q. What happens when an applicant has already paid for all the expenses and is requesting reimbursement for the insurance deductible amount? Is this allowable?

Reimburse such a homeowner after you:

- Inspect work and document full payment to the contractor
- Confirm permits were obtained and related liens released.

SHIP-DR cannot reimburse an amount that exceeds the deductible

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Q. If the homeowner states they are in litigation with the insurance company, should we continue processing their application?



- Do not continue to process such an application.
- Applicants may inform your office when litigation is over, and they have received an insurance claim check.
- It is not that litigation makes an applicant ineligible.
- Limited funds focus on cases that are ready to proceed.







- Q. A client is asking for our deductible assistance specifically to purchase new furniture. Is this allowable?
- Cannot receive deductible assistance for anything except funding to pay a contractor to repair her home.
- SHIP rehab strategy would not pay for furniture.
- Have applicant review insurance policy to see if there was coverage for personal belongings, valuables, and furnishings.



Q. A couple of people do not want to file any claims with their insurance, and one reason given is that it could raise their premium in the future. Can applicants still apply for funding if they choose not to work with their insurance company?

They must file a claim to get assistance. This falls under the topic of duplication of benefits. SHIP staff have identified insurance as a source to pay for most repairs.

Q. Is Florida Housing implementing a particular Resident Income Certification (RIC) for the hurricane disaster relief funding or do we use our current RIC?

Local governments should use the regular RIC for disaster assistance files.




All FEMA Registrants Should Apply at Unite Florida Portal
